METHODOLOGY

The survey was sponsored by *Insider NJ* and conducted by StimSight Research on July 18-24, 2025 with a sample of 1,108 probable voters in the 2025 New Jersey general election, drawn from a list of voters who have participated in at least two elections in the past five cycles. Interviews were conducted in English and included both self-administered online surveys via a text-to-web invitation link and live telephone interviews. The full sample is weighted for party registration, region, age, gender, race, and education based on the probabilistic demographic composition of the state electorate. The sampling margin of error for this poll is ± 3.3 percentage points.

Race: 65% White non-Hispanic, 14% Hispanic, 11% Black, 9% Asian, 1% other

Education: 28% high school or less, 24% some college, 29% BA/BS degree, 19% graduate degree

Income: 49% under \$100,000, 37% \$100-199,000, 15% \$200,000 or more

Has children: 21% yes

Union household: 25% yes

Public employee household: 29% yes

Region: 15% Northeast, 12% Urban Core, 17% Route 1 Corridor, 13% Central Hills, 17% Northern Shore, 16% Delaware Valley, 10% Garden Core
