Republicans lose voters' trust on the issues

- Trump's overall approval rating is holding: 46% of voters approve of Trump's job performance and 52% disapprove, unchanged from last week.
- It's a different story on the issues: In terms of specific policy areas, it is Trump's
  worse week since he took office in January. Net approval of his handling of
  national security (-3), Medicare and Social Security (-9), taxes (-8) and LGBTQ+
  rights (-15) are all at record lows. His net approval ratings on immigration (+4) and
  trade (-7) are tied for record lows.
- Spillover for Republicans in Congress: Similarly, we also find congressional
  Republicans experiencing one of their worst weeks on the issue front. They trail
  their Democratic counterparts in trust to handle the economy and taxes by 4
  percentage points and foreign policy by 2 percentage points, all of which are
  record-high deficits in 2025. Their advantage on national security is also down to
  2 points, the smallest we've measured this year.
- Kimmel's suspension breaks through: ABC's decision to indefinitely suspend
  Jimmy Kimmel's late-night show following his comments about Charlie Kirk's
  assassination is last week's most salient news item, with 49% saying they heard
  "a lot" about it, compared with 46% who heard a lot about Tyler Robinson's
  indictment on murder charges for Kirk's killing.
