

This Washington Post-Schar School poll was conducted by telephone September 25-29, 2025, among a random sample of 1,002 registered voters in Virginia, with 65 percent reached by live callers on cellphones, 15 percent on landlines and 20 percent cellphone text-to-web. Results among both registered and likely voters have a margin of error of plus or minus 3.4 percentage points, including design effects due to weighting. All registered voters were assigned a probability of voting to produce likely voter results. Sampling, field work and data processing by Braun Research or Princeton, N.J.; the sample was drawn from a database of Virginia registered voters maintained by Aristotle, Inc.

Full methodological details and sampling error margins for subgroups are appended at the end of this document.

This poll was jointly sponsored and funded by The Washington Post and George Mason University's Schar School of Policy and Government. The poll was conducted in English among a random sample of registered voters in Virginia.

This questionnaire was administered with the exact questions in the exact order as they appear in this document. Demographic questions are not shown. If a question was asked of a reduced base of the sample, a parenthetical preceding the question identifies the group asked. Phrases surrounded by parentheticals within questions indicate clauses that were randomly rotated for respondents.

A total of 1,002 interviews were completed through a stratified random sample from a database of Virginia registered voters maintained by Aristotle, Inc., in which voters were matched to landline and cellular phone numbers. All registered voters were assigned a probability of voting to produce results among likely voters based on analysis of past election polls estimating the relationship between past turnout and self-reported likelihood of voting and future election turnout. The overall sample size for likely voters is the same as registered voters (1,002).

This survey uses statistical weighting procedures to account for deviations in the survey sample from known population characteristics, which helps correct for differential survey participation and random variation in samples.

The sample was weighted to match population estimates for the demographic makeup of Virginia registered voters, as detailed in the table below.

All error margins have been adjusted to account for the survey's design effect, which is 1.2. The design effect is a factor representing the survey's deviation from a simple random sample and takes into account decreases in precision due to sample design and weighting procedures. Surveys that do not incorporate a design effect overstate their precision.

For Q7, open-ended responses were combined and coded by BTInsights, an AI open-end coding software that sorted responses into similar categories. Each response was then reviewed by a Post polling team member to ensure it was accurately categorized, if necessary, recategorized. Category names were also edited after a review of all codes within each group.
