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### Methodology Statement

Bowling Green State University/YouGov Survey of Ohio Likely Voters

Survey Research Field Dates: April 7th – 14th, 2026

N = 1000 Ohio Registered Voters

Overall MOE: +/- 3.88

Sample A (Questions 33 and 34) MOE: +/- 5.62

Sample B (Questions 35, 36, and 37) MOE: +/- 5.37

YouGov interviewed 1146 Ohio registered voters who were then matched down to a sample of 1000 to produce the final dataset. The respondents were matched to a sampling frame on gender, age, race, and education. The sampling frame is a politically representative "modeled frame" of US adults, based upon the American Community Survey (ACS) public use microdata file, the 2024 Current Population Survey (CPS) Voting and Registration supplements, and the 2024 National Election Pool (NEP) exit poll.

The matched cases were weighted to the sampling frame using propensity scores. The matched cases and the frame were combined and a logistic regression was estimated for inclusion in the frame. The propensity score function included age, gender, race/ethnicity, years of education, and home ownership. The propensity scores were grouped into deciles of the estimated propensity score in the frame and post stratified according to these deciles. The weights were then post-stratified on 2024 presidential vote choice as well as a four-way stratification of gender, age (4-categories), race (4-categories), and education (4-categories), to produce the final weight. The final weight yielded a sample that reflects a +11 recalled vote margin for Donald Trump over Kamala Harris in the 2024 presidential race.

**Property Tax Experiment:** 500 Respondents in Sample A were shown the following prompt *prior* to answering Questions 33 and 34, while 500 Respondents in Sample B were shown the following prompt *after* answering Question 35 and before answering Questions 36 and 37.

Property taxes currently provide about 60% of funds for public schools in Ohio. Around 16% of funding for programs related to developmental disabilities, child protective services, and elderly care come from property taxes. Although it differs across the state, cities and townships receive about 7-15% of their funding for local roads, bridges, and traffic signals, parks, and libraries through property taxes.

If property taxes were eliminated in Ohio, it is estimated that the state would need to increase the sales tax by 10 to 20% more than the current rate of 5.75% to maintain the existing level of local government services.
