2026 Republican Primary Election

Survey conducted July 5 through July 7, 2026. 650 likely Republican Primary Election voters participated in the survey. Survey weighted to match likely 2026 Republican Primary Election turnout demographics. Margin of Error is +/-3.8% with a 95% level of confidence. Totals do not always equal 100% due to rounding. (6/24) results in parentheses.



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Q1: Candidates in the upcoming Republican Primary election for Governor are listed below. If the election were held today, for whom would you vote?

Andy Biggs: 69% (64%)
David Schweikert: 10% (8%)
Ken Miceli: 3% (1%)
Scott Neely: 3% (3%)
Undecided: 16% (23%)

Q2: Candidates in the upcoming Republican Primary election for United States Congress are listed below. If the election were held today, for whom would you vote?

Daniel Keenan: 42% (35%)
Mark Lamb: 40% (43%)
Undecided: 18% (22%)

Q5: Daniel Keenan opposes selling off public lands and parks to build high-density housing and supports keeping that land for future generations to enjoy.

Q6: Daniel Keenan is the candidate most closely aligned with President Trump's agenda on election integrity, mass deportations, and making life more affordable for working families.

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Q9: Same-sex surrogacy arrangements give a child to two men and deny that child a mother by design. Daniel Keenan is the only candidate in the race who will introduce a ban on this practice.
